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Letter to Parishioners



Dear Friends,
Acts 17 verses 16-34
What do you think about when you hear
'Athens?' It may well be that you think about
the great ruins such as the Parthenon,
sculptures, philosophers such as Socrates and

Plato who were born in that city or Aristotle who made it his home. You may think of maths and logic, but not for too long as it brings back painful memories of Pythagoras theorem. Do you remember it:

Pythagoras' theorem states that for all right-angled triangles, 'The square on the hypotenuse is equal to the sum of the squares on the other two sides'. The hypotenuse is the longest side and it's always opposite the right angle.

I will not ask you if you ever used that in everyday life. Not sure I ever have. Let us move swiftly on before we are all re-traumatised by school maths memories.

To help us understand this passage I am going to look at it under the following headings:

What Paul saw

What Paul felt

What Paul did

What Paul said

What was the response?

What Paul saw - verse 16

Paul is in Athens - verse 16. He is there waiting the arrival of Timothy and Silas to join him. From Athens he will travel on to Corinth. On several occasions in this passage Paul tells us that as he walked around

Athens he looked closely at what he witnessed. Paul was not your typical tourist 'doing' Athens. You know how it is when you go to such a place. People taking photographs and selfies. No doubt there would be a Japanese family all squeezing in to a photograph with the Parthenon in the background. But Paul is not on a tourist trip and Athens is not just another city to tick off his bucket list before he dies.

Paul says he looked carefully at the city and he saw a city full of idols. The phrase he uses can be translated as a city saturated, overrun and dominated by idols. A saying of the day said it was easier to meet a god in Athens than a man. It was a veritable forest of idols. This is what Paul saw everywhere he turned in that great city.

What Paul felt - verse 16 - he was deeply distressed by what he saw. Luke uses a Greek word from which we get the english 'paroxysm.' It had a medical association - relating to a seizure such as an epileptic fit. When Paul looked around him at Athens he was deeply distressed and troubled by what he saw. The idols distressed him. Why? Well, firstly being brought up a devout Jew he knew the commandment against making any graven images and the commandment that there was only one true God to worship. Secondly, after meeting Christ on the road to Damascus, Paul knew that there was salvation outside of Christ and that all these people were lost in their idolatry. Paul is deeply and continually distressed by the idolatry around him because he knows Isaiah 42.8 that God will not share His glory with idols and he knows Exodus 34.14 that God is a jealous God and that He alone is to be worshipped.

Paul looks at Athens the cultural capital of the ancient near east. He is deeply distressed because he realises that as a city it was morally decadent, spiritually deceived, aesthetically beautiful, culturally brilliant but philosophically confused.

Let me ask you something: How do you feel when you walk around our town or Belfast? What do you see? What do you feel? I would suggest most of us walk around blind to the idols that proliferate in our town and

city. We visit somewhere and we take photographs to show everyone, maybe even post them on Facebook. Yet our town, cities etc are submerged in idolatry. I can see the expression on your faces - we don't have idols all around us. Really! What about the idols of materialism and consumerism? What about the great god sex, which so dominates our culture? What about the idols of technology, of political correctness and maybe the greatest of all at the moment of 'tolerance?' Are we distressed by all these idols that get worshipped every day by the vast majority of our family, friends, neighbours and community? Do we feel distressed deeply because people are worshipping at the altars of these idols and in so doing are lost in their sins?

What Paul did - look at verses 17-18.

So... begins verse 17. In response to what he saw and what he felt Paul began to reason with them. First he went to the synagogue, our equivalent to church and reasoned with them. He made a reasonable appeal to them. It was not just an emotional appeal and it was not just him sharing his experiences but he reasoned from the Scriptures and we are told he shared about Jesus and the resurrection with them. He then moved to the market place and every day he reasoned with those who happened to be there. He went to the equivalent of Starbucks and McD's and engaged the people he met in conversation. He just went to where the people were and talked to them. Day by day in the market place, the everyday place of the city, he engaged with people in conversation.

Notice will you what he did - he reasoned with them. He did not shout at them about their idolatry. He didn't trivialise it either. Nor did he trivialise the gospel. He did not go around sharing Jesus as if he was an added extra to your life. No, he reasoned, he was able to give an intellectual reason for his faith and this he did in the market square. Now hear me now. We are not talking here about the open air preacher in Corn Market with the loudspeaker haranguing people as they pass by.

He was talking to them over a coffee and a doughnut or the Athenian equivalent.

Then he went to the academy, the Aeropagus. Well, if you look at the verses closely you will see he was invited to come and talk to that body of people. In his everyday conversations he encountered the Epicurean and the Stoics. You may wonder who they were, or are, because their philosophies are still with us.

Epicureans - considered gods to be remote. They believed that this world was here by chance and all things were random acts. They did not believe in anything after death, no judgment and certainly no resurrection. Therefore people should pursue enjoyment and a life detached from pain, from passion and from fear.

Stoics - acknowledged a supreme god in a pantheistic manner. They believed the world was dominate by fate and that human beings must pursue their duty, resigning themselves to live in harmony with nature and reason, no matter how painful. People were to develop their own self-sufficiency.

Those two philosophies are still with us. Epicureans - eat, drink and be merry because tomorrow we die. Stoics - you cannot control any of it, karma, what goes around comes around, that is your fate in life. Don't you meet that every day, maybe even in your own thoughts on some days. Certainly our younger generations are a mixture of these philosophies, just listen to their music sometime. Read the lyrics - the despair, the impermanence of everything, the random chances of life. It is clearer in older songs of my generation:

Kris Kristofferson:

I don't care who's right or wrong
I don't try to understand
Let the devil take tomorrow
'Cause tonight I need a friend
Yesterday is dead and gone
And tomorrow's out of sight

And it's sad to be alone Help me make it through the night.

That is the epicurean and stoic philosophy of Athens in a nutshell. It matters not who is right or wrong, tomorrow may not come so live for today. Enjoy life, enjoy the pleasures of this life because when you are dead you are dead and there is nothing else.

What Paul said - verses 22 following. In his speech, which I am assuming Luke has summarised for us because it only takes a couple of minutes to read, Paul says the following:

God is the Creator of the Universe - verse 24. Paul tells them that God cannot be domesticated or tamed by men.

God is the Sustainer of life - verse 25. God does not need us or anything from us, the very opposite is true. He gives us life and sustains our lives each day.

God is the Father of human beings - verse 26. We derive our being form Him, not Him from us. He formed us in our mother's womb as Psalm 139 tells us. He has allotted the times of our lives and the boundaries of our dwelling places.

God the Ruler of the nations - verse 26. God is not distant nor is He subordinate to man. In fact He rules over all the nations. As the Scriptures teach He raises men and nations and brings them down as well. He sets the boundaries of nations.

God is near - if man would only seek Him - verses 27-28. To support this assertion Paul quotes two of their own poets. He makes the cultural connection with them. The first quote is from a poet named Epimenides and the second Aratus. Paul uses their own words to sharpen his point that God is near and they are to seek God. The message is simple - the kingdom of God is at hand, repent and believe in the One raised from the dead, the Lord Jesus Christ. It hasn't changed either.

God is the Judge of the Word - verse 30. There is a certainty about what Paul says here. This judgment will be universal, all the world, living and the dead will be judged. It will be righteous because God will judge with justice. It will be definite, a day has been fixed and appointed. That day is nearer than ever. God will judge the world by the One He raised from the dead - Jesus Christ. Whilst the day has not been disclosed the judge has been revealed - Jesus Christ. In the past Paul says God overlooked their ignorance as they bowed down to idols etc. But now, but now God has revealed Himself in the Lord Jesus Christ and men are without excuse. Read Romans 1-3 sometime this week and you can see how Paul develops that argument further. Ignorance of the past was overlooked but now things are different. They are commanded, a divine order, to repent because there is a judgment to come. Here is the climactic warning of Paul's address to them - God is near, God raised Jesus from the dead, repent and believe in Him because there is a day appointed when all men will be judged. This is how the writer to the Hebrews puts it - Hebrews 9.27 - READ.

What was the response to Paul?

Well, if you turn to verse 18 you will see that the first response is that Paul is a 'babbler.' The Greek here can be translated a 'seed picker.' What they were saying is that Paul was like a little bird picking up seeds, gathering them from here and there. In essence they were saying he was gathering other people's ideas and putting them together as his own. A bird brain picking up intellectual crumbs and trying to put them together in to his own loaf of bread. Hardly the response of those who were impressed.

However, verse 19, as we see some of them wanted to hear more and so they take him to the Aeropagus to speak to them. Again we have several responses when he has finished speaking.

Look at verse 32 - some of them mocked Paul because he preached the resurrection of the dead. The Epicureans amongst the listeners did not believe in anything after death, so they mocked him.

Again in verse 32 some others were curious, maybe just intellectually curious because as we read in verse 21 the Athenians liked to spend their days listening to 'something new.'

Yet, verse 34, some believed the good news of Jesus Christ and followed Paul. Amongst them Dionysius and a woman called Damaris.

Allow me to suggest a couple of very practical applications that you can spend the rest of this week putting in to practice.

First thing is to open your eyes to the idols around you. I want to suggest to you that we should be distressed by the idols of our day as Paul was distressed by the idols of Athens. Maybe, just maybe, we do not truly believe that people who die without Christ go to hell. Maybe, just maybe we do not actually believe God will judge the living and the dead and therefore we are not deeply troubled in our hearts and souls when we see people going astray. The idols of materialism, consumerism, fame, wealth, status, sexual liberty, sport, leisure, technology, even church and religion abound in our lives and in this community. Are you distressed by them? Is your heart and mind troubled by them? Do you even notice them?

Secondly, take a chess set, if you play chess, or some book or game or something and go and sit in Creed or Season and just talk to people. Just talk to people. Ask them what they are reading? Ask them how the family are? You will be amazed at the conversations that will begin - but, and here is where the rubber hits the road, that is your task, not mine. Mine is to equip you to do that. Don't tell me it cannot be done and you cannot do it. Many of you do it every Thursday at Fellowship Cafe - the only difference is the geographical location. So get out there and do it. No more excuses.

Finally, make the cultural connections with those around you. You are doing it already but you just do not think of the gospel connections with them. Some of you watch the soaps - the opportunities that those story lines give to raise questions of faith, of morals etc. You have connections with people all the time through leisure, through technology etc - do you consciously think of them as opportunities to share about Jesus. Paul did in a city in which he only spent a few weeks. He made the cultural connections. Some mocked, they will mock you. Some just wanted to ask more questions out of curiosity and some believed. The same will happen when you begin to engage this community with the good news of Jesus Christ.


